OLOC's last Gathering was less than six months ago, so, of course, it's time for the national Steering Committee to begin work on 2016, and that's what we've been doing. After Oakland, we figure it's time for our next

Gathering to be held in the southeast, so on October 15th we headed to Atlanta for our fall meeting.

Twice a year the Steering Committee meets for four intensive days from 9 to 5 to do OLOC business. During our fall meeting in October, we invited four members of ZAMI

ZAMI NOBLA conducts a list serve and holds meetings twice monthly. They described their work on health issues for aging Lesbians and their plans for a "national Hotline to provide a listening ear, information, and

assistance with resources available to aging Black Lesbians," as well as "Care Teams to support Black Lesbians, their partners, children, and caregivers needing assistance around health and social challenges." The happy result of

our meeting is a partnership and the beginning of plans for the 2016 OLOC National Gathering in Atlanta and for a concert to be held April 25, 2015, to promote the next Gathering.

Every one of us on the OLOC Steering Committee agreed we are a good fit with ZAMI NOBLA, and we all left the meeting in the room at the Atlanta airport Holiday Inn North elated and eager to work together.

# Hotel Survey from the OLOC 2014 Gathering in Oakland, CA

Thank you to all who attended the Oakland Gathering and responded to the hotel survey. I was hoping this would provide guidance in our hotel search (now underway) for the National Gathering in Atlanta in 2016. One thing was made extremely clear: even though a few liked the choice of Marriott, many more did not like Marriott because of Mormon politics. So it is a very clear message from you—no Marriott for 2016.

The other thing that was clear was that breakfast inclusion is very important. While we may not be able to match the quality of breakfast, we are listening to your requests to have it included in the hotel room rate.

Some of the other questions had more mixed answers. While most of you liked the downtown location and closeness to

restaurants, many wanted things that just don't exist in downtown hotels in major cities, such as free airport shuttle, free parking, large rooms, low-cost rooms, and inexpensive food in the hotel. We will try to meet your wishes, but please understand that we can't find everything we would like.

Thank you for so many compliments. Many of you were very happy for accessibility for Lesbians with disabilities. Many loved the hospitality room, though there were complaints of its being too small. I do want to tell you that the Presidential Suite was the largest suite in the hotel. Also the larger public rooms do not allow outside food to be brought in. So, we may not be able to have a larger hospitality room.

We hear you and will try very hard to keep the costs to a minimum. Thanks again for your participation in the Gathering and in the survey.



Beverly Sills once said, "There are no shortcuts to any place worth going." For the Old Lesbian Oral Herstory Project, the place worth going is usually a mission we are striving to fulfill, not a physical place. The mission of the OLOHP is to gather and preserve the unique life stories of Old Lesbians, concentrating on those 70 years of age and older. But this summer, the place worth going was also a physical place, the 2014 OLOC Gathering in Oakland.



Striving toward our mission has led to our developing strong persistence muscles—after fifteen years of the OLOHP, the term *shortcut* is no longer even in our vocabulary! If it's worth doing, it's worth doing well, and worth working around any obstacles found in the pathway. Getting to Oakland definitely presented the Project some interesting challenges, but we made it, and it was worth it!

The Old Lesbian Oral Herstory Project presented on Sunday morning, and despite being first on deck after what was a rockin' Saturday night dance that went late into the night, we had a good crowd. Best of all, those attending were a wonderful mix of women who knew almost nothing about the Project, women who were familiar with it but not yet involved, and women who are currently involved in the Herstory Project, actively conducting interviews and transcribing. The presentation must have hit the right note, because we came away with a long list of women interested in being interviewed, becoming interviewers, and asking to receive our newsletter. While there in the Oakland area, we were also able to conduct nine interviews!

# Oakland Gathering Exciting But Expensive

Everyone is curious as to the financial outcome of OLOC's Oakland Gathering, and, although we may receive more information or move things around in categories, we can tell you that we lost money—a little over \$24,000. The Oakland Marriott charged us \$40,000 for two meals for two hundred Lesbians. I know, we gagged at that number, too, but we had no choice, and Ruth negotiated the best prices possible. Anyway, between hotel meals, disability services, and financial assistance, we paid out quite a bit more than we took in. The table shows the figures we have now.

We've been talking a lot about Financial Assistance and it's clear that we need to change our policy of giving every Old Lesbian what she asks for to be able to attend the Gathering. The Steering Committee has read the feedback and comments about Financial Assistance from those who attended and filled out the form. We are interested in any constructive ideas you may have. So send us your thoughts and reasoning. Of course, our budget is limited and entirely dependent on donations.

#### More on OLOC's Cost for Gathering By Jan Griesinger, 1942

Our wonderful National Gathering provided financial assistance to many Lesbians who would not not otherwise have been able to attend. We spent almost \$25,000 toward travel, hotel stays, and the two meals provided to all as part of the registration fees. We actually received a bit over \$12,000 from donors (largely you wonderful OLOC members) to support this program, and we also received \$9,700 from grants to help pay for it.

Our cost to provide disability services was over \$11,000—for scooters, closed captioning, assisted listening devices and hotel rooms as needed for access. Overall, the event cost us more than it brought in, which is not what we had hoped would happen, but we are so glad all women who wanted to attend could do so. We will survive and thrive and keep on moving forward, never turning back.

#### Cleveland OLOC Goes All Out for GG9 By Judy Benson, 1946

This summer proved to be a busy one for OLOC with one of the largest National Gatherings. Women from Cleveland made Steering Committee member Sally Tatnall proud with their contributions and participation in this huge and diverse event. In addition Cleveland OLOC was a major part of the PRIDE Prime Time Senior area, and the end of the summer saw OLOC members involved in Gay Games 9, which was hosted in Cleveland.



Several OLOC members proudly marched with the OLOC banner in the Gay Games 9 Opening Ceremony.

Scholarships were provided for targeted groups, and OLOC was on hand to help with the process and make sure no senior was left behind. This opening ceremony featured many speakers, entertainers, and participants from all over the world and included for the first time ever a video welcome from President Barack Obama. It was one of the largest and finest efforts of the Cleveland LGBT community.

OLOC contributed to the discussion of ageism and Old Pride during the educational Game Change day held at the University of Akron. Sally Tatnall and Judy Benson held a workshop that helped participants define ageism and identify examples of it in everyday advertising. The workshop was primarily for those involved in social

services and included straight, gay, and transgender participants.

Sally and Judy were also interviewed by the local PBS affiliate from Kent State University. The interview was part of the feature story "Like any family, the Gay Games has its generation gaps," which was broadcast the next day on the Morning Edition segment. # Katharine "Kittu" Parker Riddle, 1919–2014

In 1990 Kittu was one of the visionaries for the creation of OLOC, and she served on the Steering Committee during the early years. Her autobiography, *A Nourishing Life* (1999),

recounts her life of service helping to create spaces that nourish women, including Nourishing Space for Women, 156 acres in Arizona, which served over 1000 women between 1975 and 1978 and was the site for the first formal gathering in the U.S. of Lesbians over 50. Some of her story also appears in the Old Lesbian Oral Herstory Project book *Without Apology: Old Lesbian Life Stories*.

Kittu was born in the Himalayan Mountains of northern India, the oldest daughter of Presbyterian missionaries. She earned an M.Sc. in nutrition from the University of Chicago and, in 1975, completed a Ph.D. on the nourishment of living systems through Union Graduate School. During her life she created many networks for women across geographic, age, and lifestyle differences who shared common concerns of world hunger.



Kittu is held in loving memory by her daughters Dorothy and Patty, her son Bill, her brother Don, and her life partner Margot Kostenbader, as well as a multitude of family and friends.

### Beverly (Bev) Hickok 1919–2014

Bev Hickok, our oldest Bay Area OLOC member, passed away peacefully in October after participating in the Oakland Gathering, which celebrated our 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Bev was an alumna of

UCLA. She returned to UC Berkeley as a librarian in 1948, built their Transporta

1948, built their Transportation Library from scratch, and served as its head librarian for 32 years.

During the Second World War she was a riveter in the Douglas Aircraft defense plant, where she met other women she identified as Lesbians like herself. In 1944, she joined the US Navy WAVES and served until 1946. In 2004 she published her book *Against the Current: Coming Out in the 1940s*. She will be deeply missed by all who knew her.

## **Feminist Party Member Elected**

**Ageism:** Selections from the *Older Feminists Network* newsletter, Aug/Sept 2014, London, England

"One of the obvious consequences of our current culture, namely the pressure on women to look younger, led to the huge growth of the anti-ageing industry. Eyebrow lifts are up 17%, neck lifts 14%. 2013 saw an increase of 109% in inquiries about labiaplasty. . . ."

To paraphrase Baba Copper, author of Over the Hill: Reflections on Ageism Between Women: "Patriarchal attitudes are shaped in childhood. Older women are seen as powerless, less important than the fathers and the children, only there to serve and, like those who serve, soon to be invisible." Copper demands that younger women share with the old the respect and power generated among women. She says, "Ageism screens communication between young and old like a one-way mirror—the old can see the younger, aided as they are by memories of their own youth, but the young cannot or will not see their future in the old. Sensing that vital information may be hidden on the other side of the mirror, the young press their faces against it, to scan their reflection nervously for the imperfections of age: the old on the other side watch with sadness recognizing their own denial of aging in the young women's faces."

### Ban the Word Feminist?

In November, *Time* magazine published its annual list of words they think deserve and/or need to be banned. On the list? *Feminist*. *Time* correspondent Katy Steinmetz asked, "When did it become a thing that every celebrity had to state their position on whether this word applies to them...?" And 45 percent of *TIME* readers voted for the word, according to E! Online Writer/Reporter/Editor Jenna Mullins.

Reaction was instant. Freelance journalist Susan Rohwer, for one, said in an *LA Times* opinion piece, "Considering the state of things

for women all over the world, shouldn't we be fighting tooth and nail to spread the ideas of feminism far and wide...?"

Within a week, *Time* managing editor Nancy Gibbs added this apology to the website: "The word 'feminist' should not have been included in a list of words to ban...." Saying they "meant to invite debate about some ways the word was used this year," they were sorry it had instead "become a distraction from the important debate over equality and justice."

That's fine, but the word was solidly in the middle of the list in Steinmetz's original article. I don't wonder people took it seriously.

One Spirit (In regard to the letter from Elana Dykewomon in the last issue) By Alix Doblin.1940

Dear Elana.

I can understand why the Ohlone people were unable to give our Gathering their blessing. I respectfully accept their decision as consistent with Ohlone values and traditions, which I also respect.

I am glad that we had their permission to be on Ohlone land, and I feel no guilt for my and our role in not having their blessing because we didn't want a male voice in our opening. But I am curious as to better ways to meet future questions like the Ohlone response to our Opening Night invitation.

The feminist Second Wave sought to be universally female-inclusive by, among other things, expanding the definition of "woman." I honor my tradition and the sacred distinction I have learned to identify as "woman" among human beings. This, along with a belief in women-only space as truly sacred, truly unique, and life-affirming, often likens us believers to members of a species threatened with extinction.

Ever since the Gathering, I think of myself as a Single-Spirit woman increasing my capacity to understand, respect, and possibly even admire Two—and even Three—Spirit humans. The question is, can we honor our differences and work together for universal justice with no certainly as to outcome? I believe that mutually respectful discussion can only move us forward and strengthen our alliances.

Nice, non-aggressive white people can move in the world without thinking about the "potholes" or the "gravel" that people of color have to navigate, or how things that they do—not intending to hurt or endanger anyone—might actually be making life more difficult or more dangerous for a person of color.
