
News of the Gathering

Jewelle Gomez, 1948, wrote a play about Alberta Hunter, star blues singer/songwriter from the 1920s and 1930s. It is opening at New Conservatory Theatre Center in San Francisco on March 3, 2017 (this is the World Premiere), and runs through April 2, 2017. Jewelle says: "Alberta wrote Bessie Smith's first big hit. She retired, became a nurse, and then made a comeback when she was 80! I saw her several times and was inspired, especially when my grandmother confirmed the rumor that Alberta was a Lesbian." Her songs have been covered by Women's Music musicians. You will recognize them.

Jewelle suggests, "OLOC might want to get a group rate and bring some members." The theatre is accessible, with an elevator down from the lobby and movable seats in the first row.

You'd think reaching a huge milestone like completing 500 interviews with Old Lesbians would have been a good stopping point. But no. Instead, we keep reaching out to find Lesbians willing to share their life stories. So we're now nearing the 550 mark and have quite a few more planned.

We're also in the early stages of creating a Finding Aid (a document containing detailed information about a specific collection of papers or records within an archive) for each story. OLOHP Finding Aids would help ensure that the collective stories of our amazing lives are more useful to researchers.

As we continue with our ongoing work interviewing Lesbians 70 and older, we're also beginning to expand our focus. We're pretty sure this will be a huge undertaking, and we welcome more volunteers to help! See OLOHP.org or write to info@OLOHP.org.

Memorials

Ruth Mountaingrove, 1923-2016

In the 1980s, Ruth Mountaingrove edited ten issues of *The Reporter*. She was born in Philadelphia in 1923 but lived on the West Coast most of her life. She earned a Master of Arts in Photography in 1990 from Humboldt



State University, Arcata, California. She had numerous one-woman exhibitions in her career. Her work in photography since 1986 was largely a process she called "Drawing with Light." This work looks more like sumi ink drawings, or in some cases like paintings.

In 1946, she published her first book of poetry, *Rhythms of Spring*. She was a research chemist with five children when she became involved in the early feminist movement and met her future partner, Jean Mountaingrove, 1925. In the 1970s, she and two of her children joined Jean at Mountaingrove, an intentional community in rural southern Oregon. Ruth and Jean became central figures in the Southern Oregon women's land movement, publishing *Womanspirit Magazine*, founding and co-editing *Blatant Image*, and organizing *Ovulars*. There she began her next creative and productive life journey as a musician and composer. Ruth was creative, funny, inspirational, courageous, independent, outspoken, and determined.

Northern Colorado Chapter

We shifted our [planned] election celebration to organizing for change by writing a collective letter to our members of Congress and participated in "Moving Toward Collective Liberation," a gathering of state LGBTQ groups. Agreeing to follow the suggestions in "Indivisible: A Practical Guide for Resisting the Trump Agenda," we are actively contacting our members of Congress and attending town hall meetings.

In January, we read four articles: "Sex and Gender" from the Center for Gender Sanity. "Perpetrating Gender" (an excerpt from Becoming Nicole) by Amy Ellis Nutt, "Compulsory Heterosexuality and Lesbian Existence" by Adrienne Rich, and "One Is Not Born a Woman" by Monique Wittig. Our intention was to listen to what other women are really saying about who they are so we can move forward together on our common goal of working against oppressions that affect Old Lesbians. We also participated in the Women's March on Denver. In February, one of our transgender members gave an educational and personal program to deepen our understanding.

Our March meeting will be with youth looking for intersections between our activist lives and their knowledge of technology.

New Mexico Chapter

In December, a group of us attended the ABQ WOW (Women of the World) Poetry Slam Championship in Albuquerque. We identified ourselves to the crowd as Old Lesbians Organizing for Change, and our Chapter Coordinator, Elizabeth Berrey, 1945, volunteered to be a judge for the contest. The competition among the young poets dealt with the challenges of sexism, racism, homophobia, classism, patriarchy, love, and relationships. Absent, however, was any reference to ageism from these young women. Perhaps next year an elder poet

among us will step into the competitive fray and educate the audiences about what it feels like to be an Old Lesbian.

On January 21st, we participated in the Women's March on Washington by joining rallies in Albuquerque and Santa Fe while one of our members headed to Washington, DC, to lend her voice to that rally. We hoisted our banner in Albuquerque at the Civic Center to show solidarity with the many unique cultural groups across New Mexico and to proclaim that women's rights are human rights. For me, the rally was transforming in that I stood with women, children, and men of all ages, feeling supported for who I am and what I value.

Pioneer Valley, MA Chapter

Pioneer Valley OLOC delved deeper into raising our awareness about transgender issues and anti-racism with a full two-hour meeting for each topic.

Gloria's Corner (Puget Sound)

One-tenth of a century! A decade! Ten Years! Puget Sound OLOC is alive and pulsing with energy. The growth of this group over these years astounds me. The enthusiastic work of so many Lesbians to provide community, coalitions, and allies at our sides is heart-warming and a large factor in feeling safe. We live in a state [Washington] that has been insulated from major attacks of fear and hate. This hasn't come easily, but through the work of folks going to organizations, meetings, and door-to-door to introduce themselves, shake hands, and talk earnestly one-on-one. That led to votes locally and statewide to pass legislation (before the Supreme Court decision) to protect our relationships. The brewing political storm will bring unknown challenges. I can't see the future, but I do know that what we have done to form a tight community of Old Lesbians and allies will aid us in weathering that storm.

At Standing Rock

When I heard about what was happening at Standing Rock, North Dakota, I was enormously moved.

I had always felt deeply about indigenous people being forced off their land; being robbed of their culture; being separated from a way of life close to land, animals, and nature; being forced into impoverishment; and being perpetually plundered and imprisoned. This resonates with my Jewish history and its landlessness, being robbed and murdered, being a nation of survivors. Perhaps the closeness to land and nature and the ardent protection of the sacredness of earth and water resonate with me as a woman identified with women whose bodies represent living earth and whose sensibilities represent caring and nurturance. Perhaps it is the way in which, as an Old Lesbian, I understand what it means to be outside a dominant culture and what harm abuse and marginalization create.

I felt that this issue represents something I had to put my body into; I still had a chance to stand for what I believed in, and I was grateful to have the opportunity to do this.

I saw that this was a major front in which to make a difference in supporting a community against an army of corporate greed, against powerful men who are willing to run over and destroy any aspect of life that stands in their way.

The three of us who traveled from the Northeast to Cannonball, North Dakota, were unsure of what we would encounter. On entering the community that had grown around resistance to the Dakota Access Pipeline, we felt belonging, generosity, and acceptance. The sense of purpose around a clear intention of peace, prayer, and nonviolence, according to Lakota Sioux tradition, kept people centered around values that would benefit all of us rather than a few.



Phoenix, AZ: 20,000. Good speakers and music. Many Lesbians and a few gay men, some with children. Many hetero families with their children. Significant representation of women 50+. Sylvia Larcamp Brown, 1939

I was in DC. An amazing milestone. This has propelled solidarity to a new level. Demonstrations were held in several Hudson Valley [NY] cities, yet 1200 showed up for a local Woodstock march, though my daughter and grandson traveled from there to NYC! Alix Dobkin. 1940

It really feels as if we have reclaimed "pussy" from being derogatory to powerful. Loved seeing all the pussy hats. One woman made one with rainbows on the ears. Ruth Debra. 1944

In Santa Fe, NM, there were 10,000– 15,000, the largest march ever in this small city. I was impressed by how many young women were there. Pelican Lee, 1947

15,000 in Cleveland, more than any other march to date. It was glorious. Sally Tatnall, 1937

Up here in Port Townsend, we had 1000 marchers and sent 250 women to Seattle. The ferries stopped taking walk-on passengers because they were so full. Nyla Dartt, 1943

- ♦ E-mailed nominations must be received by March 15, 2017, and mailed nominations must be postmarked by March 15, 2017.
- ◆ The Award will be given to an Old Lesbian over the age of 70.
- Nominations are worldwide and for an Old Lesbian in any field of endeavor.
- Nominee's life and/or work must impact the lives of Old Lesbians.
- ◆ The Award will be presented at the 2017 National Gathering in the Tampa Bay area of Florida.
- Nominee must be alive at the time of nomination.

Nominations sent in for the canceled Atlanta Gathering will be included; therefore, it is not necessary to re-send them.
