2023 International Gathering One of the Largest Gatherings Ever!

OLOC hosted one of its largest Gatherings ever in Tempe, Arizona, last month, November 15–19, 2023! More than 160 women attended at the Doubletree Hotel from Wednesday to Sunday. The Steering Committee received so much positive feedback from the Old Lesbians who attended. A quick review of the evaluations showed an average overall ranking

of 4.47 out of 5. All of the meetings-of-the-whole were ASL [American Sign Language] interpreted as well as captioned [with CART, Communication Access Realtime Translation] which made it easier for all to "hear" and participate. And, starting with the pre-Gathering events for Lesbians of Color to gather and white women to explore racism—onto the Opening, then Thursday's first plenary, a review of OLOC's strategic planning process and progress from the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee, and beyond—the Gathering worked toward being inclusive and equitable.

Of course, there were areas for improvement, e.g., though a dozen women used scooters to get around, the conference center was NOT accessible and very challenging to get in and out of; workshops didn't include captioning or ASL, which made it challenging for some women to [follow]; though the hotel

staff were helpful, rooms were not always as anticipated; without a printed program booklet, the individual pieces of paper were confusing for many women; and three days of rain meant leaks in one of our key breakout rooms, which took it out of use; and so forth.

The presenters were outstanding, including the keynote and comic, and the Talent Show was entertaining. We hope to share some of the recordings on Zoom and hope even more Old Lesbians will join us in 2025!

OLOC ASL Zoom friends helped me see my antisouthwest USA bias; I thought about it more and decided to volunteer. I am a certified interpreter and making sure the Deaf and hard-of-hearing who use ASL as their preferred communication strategy [have access] is my passion. So I went!

And to my absolute surprise there were interpreter teams at all the parts of the Gathering where it was appropriate, except for the pre-Gathering day. I ended up interpreting the whole day by myself, not because there were women there who had requested it, but because the presenters wanted it. They understood that making the statement of inclusion and promoting awareness was a golden opportunity to stand up and be seen and experienced by our hearing sisters. There were many hearing aids in the audience, too. YES, there were masks available that were see-through for those who speech read.

There was a session where Jewish women got together; there were about a dozen of us. The CART [Communication Access Realtime Translation] was MAGNIFICENT! It was shown on two monster screens in the main room. I use a cane and the mobility access was awesome, as well; they had a FLEET of scooters. There were several accessibility issues in the hotel, especially the restaurant on multi levels with steps only.

This Gathering totally filled my heart-tank with love and affirmation and fun and the joy of being an Old Dyke. I will be there in 2025 if I am still alive, and I hope many of you who were not able to make it this time will consider joining me. The Gathering has changed my life. For real, and for good.

OLOC Gathering Workshop on Lesbians in Kenyan Refugee Camp

Once a month (second Wednesday, 3:00 P.M. EST) I coordinate an OLOC Zoom for affiliates interested in discussion of their lives and the lives of other Lesbians in the wider world. OLOC affiliates have come from New Zealand, Canada, and Ireland, as well as those in the US interested in learning more about Lesbians in other countries.

At the Gathering, a workshop presented by Washington state OLOC affiliates, Jan and Tina, was warmly appreciated by women in attendance. They have gone beyond "talking about" an issue to taking action to "be there" for their Lesbian African sisters and their children living in a refugee camp in northern Kenya. Lesbians in this camp have fled extreme anti-Lesbian attitudes in home countries, including Uganda and the Republic of Congo, where their lives are in danger. They also face ongoing harassment and violence within the camp.

The Advocates for Human Rights (https:// www.theadvocatesforhumanrights.org/LGB-TI Rights) January 2023 report concluded that the Government of Kenya has failed to uphold its human rights obligations regarding sexual orientation and gender minorities, resulting in violence, discrimination, and a context of fear for members of these groups. This report reviews specific human rights violations that require immediate attention by the Government of Kenya, including the right to freedom from discrimination and the right of everyone to an adequate standard of living, fair work, and education. The report also addresses the intersectional violations perpetrated against LGBTIQ+ individuals with disabilities. The group issued similar reports on crimes against women in Trinidad, Tobago, Uganda, Jamaica, El Salvador, Russia, Guatemala, Sudan, Ethiopia, Croatia, Honduras, Mexico, Nigeria, Cameroon, and El Salvador.

This version consists of memorials received since the 2019 Gathering and includes a composite of memorials from the 2006–2019 Gatherings (see one example

The show is visual with names and years of birth/death on the screen. There is one song at the beginning with lyrics; the rest is instrumental.

Old Lesbians Write About The 'Isms'

The Isms: Jewish Christmas, or Not (Anti-Semitism)

Did it ever wear on you that the world was assumed to be full of only heterosexuals? Every time that assumption was put on you, did you have any good choices? Saying nothing, participating in your own erasure? Saying something, disrupting the conversation, being difficult, hurting others, risking loss of friendship? Were your choices especially hard at times of greatest heterosexual joy: weddings, births? Have you had a straight, single friend respond to your pain by telling you she doesn't have heterosexual privilege, she likes Lesbians, she is just acknowledging the reality of a world full of straight people?

Less than one-third of the world identifies as Christian. Less than two-thirds of US residents do. Yet, for a month, the world around us assumes that everyone celebrates Christmas. Newscasters describe good things in even early December as "Christmas presents." Stores play Christmas music. Medical office workers insist that I have a Merry Christmas.

You may say you aren't religious, you are simply continuing the best of your family's traditions, leaving behind the worst, or that you say Happy Holidays.

If I invite you to celebrate Tu BiShvat, Jewish New Year of the Trees, I may wish you chag sameach (Hebrew for "joyful holiday"). If you invite me to your traditional Italian Seven Fishes Christmas Eve dinner, please wish me a Merry Christmas, but only while I am there, freely choosing to celebrate your holiday with you.

Please don't wish me Merry Christmas, or Happy Holidays, in December at the grocery store, or in every email, and I won't wish you Shabbat Shalom every time I see you on a Friday. If you want to wish me a happy holiday, please say it in spring, when Jews celebrate Passover, with food, songs, and stories; that is the holiday of liberation.


Book Review: Minor Feelings: An Asian American Reckoning by Cathy Park Hong

The book *Minor Feelings* was on my "to read list," and I found it through my library e-book program. Cathy Park Hong is the daughter of Korean immigrants, and this book is about her theory of "minor feelings" which she says occurs when United States optimism contradicts your own reality.

She stated that, "In the popular imagination, Asian Americans inhabit a vague purgatorial status: not white enough nor Black enough; distrusted by African Americans, ignored by whites, unless we're being used by whites to keep the Black man down."

Reading her thoughts on racism throughout the book regarding family, friends, co-workers, communities, I learned more about present day Asian racism than just the hate speeches over years that it is their fault for bringing diseases such as the Asian flu and COVID-19 to the United States. One such writing was, "We are the carpenter ants of the service industry, the apparatchiks [unquestioningly



loyal subordinates (sic)] of the corporate world. We are math-crunching middle managers who keep the corporate wheels greased but who never get promoted since we don't have the right 'face' for leadership."

To summarize some history, Cathy Park Hong stated, "Asian immigrants since 1965 have shared histories that extend beyond this nation, to our countries of origin, where our lineage has been decimated by Western imperialism, war, and dictatorships orchestrated or supported by the United States. In our efforts to belong in America, we act grateful, as if we've been given a second chance at life."

This was a very interesting book, and I recommend it to those who are starting or continuing their education on racism in the United States.



In **August**, Roberta Pato, 1946, joined with her younger Lesbian friend, Tori, to talk to our Chapter regarding the group Okay So, which is working to help LGBTQ youth who are struggling. In **September**, we joined National to see Holly Near [the Zoom event *Because of a Song:* A Conversation with Holly Near, Melanie DeMore, and Carolyn Brandy].

The Colorado Chapter spent much of our **August** meeting generating ideas and assignments to increase our visibility and build membership. Since COVID-19, we had let some things lapse that we had been doing, such as keeping monthly meeting announcements in local LGBTQ+ newsletters and participating in marches with our

participating in marches with our OLOC banner.

We first created a list of the organizations and places to contact. The list includes LGBTQ+ organizations, women's choruses, senior centers, and selected churches. We were able to get volunteers willing to contact all of these groups. Someone volunteered to draft different sizes of PR blurbs and an article to be used in getting information to these groups. Another member volunteered to research ways to get at least a basic online presence, either through social media, a website, or a page on the National OLOC website, if possible.

In **September**, after an outstanding potluck and sharing about our lives with each other, we continued discussion of outreach efforts—what had been done so far and what was still to be done.

We also looked at our existing banners and decided on text and design for a new banner.

For our **October** meeting, we hosted a presentation called "Our Forgotten Sisters: A History of Women Loving Women in Colorado" by The Colorado LGBTQ History Project. Folks in this project have been digging deep through archives to find Lesbian individuals and groups in three time periods
